

Why Focus on Procurement?

- Represents a large component of council activity and expenditure
 - o Victorian local governments spend over \$3 billion each year
 - o More than half of councils' overall expenditure
- Vital role in delivering council and community objectives
 - o Maintaining probity
 - o Reducing risk
 - o Reducing costs
 - o Achieving broader council goals
- o Broader enabler of commercial and business development
 - o Increasing complex procurement world e.g.
 - Shared use community infrastructure
 - Multi-stakeholder civil construction works
